


The transdisciplinary conference deals with the role of rivers in the production of spaces from a cultural studies and humanities perspective. For a long time, rivers have merely been regarded as objects of scientific observation and technical control of nature. They were described, measured and mapped in great detail. However, rivers are not just passive landscape elements, but they are themselves actively involved in the constitution of spaces or spatial cultures. Furthermore, rivers have the special feature that they are constantly changing and yet remain the same. One could even say that change is the only constant of a river. This fundamental changeability of the river opens up a number of possibilities for connection, because it means that the corresponding spatial cultures are kept mobile and changeable as well. The conference therefore addresses the question of what organizing capacities are produced by the river and what efforts are required in order to constitute rivers as spatial units.

The conference is organised by the research network *Fluid Spaces* at the University of Düsseldorf. The participating disciplines include the Institute of History, Romance Studies and Art History.
